All El Paso County Fair entries must be submitted through Fairentry.com.

The 4-H Dog Division is limited to only those youths properly enrolled in the El Paso County 4-H program for the current year.

Date/Time for Showmanship and Obedience: Saturday-July 15, 2017; Whittemore building; Check in at 8:00 a.m., Show at 9:00 a.m.

Date/Time for Rally and Agility: Friday-July 21, 2017; Owens arena; Check in at 1:00 p.m., Show at 2:00 p.m.

Fees: Showmanship free for all exhibitors, all other classes \$5.00 per exhibitor per dog for each class entered for Obedience, Rally and Agility.

GENERAL RULES

1. All entries must be delivered to the CSU Extension office or if mailed, must be postmarked by 5:00p.m., **the second Thursday in June. (June 8th) Mail** or bring entries to the Extension office call 719-520-7675 for address. Early entry of forms is highly encouraged. Entry fees vary by species. Make checks payable to El Paso County Extension.
NOTE: NO LATE DOG ENTRIES ACCEPTED! A dog exhibitor who misses the June entry deadline must notify the General Superintendent immediately. The exhibitor must then petition the Dog Advisory Committee in writing and, if possible, personally appear before the committee to show cause as why a late entry should be accepted.
2. Dog record books will be judged at the club and county level. Members must complete their record books after the Fair and turn them into their project leader, by the date determined by their project leader, for judging. Members failing to submit a finished record book will not be credited with a completed project and will be unable to take the same project again for one year. All animals exhibited must be in the member's record book. Project leaders should turn all record books into the extension office by the second Monday in September.

Dogs exhibited must be owned by the El Paso County 4-H member exhibiting it. All youth must have completed the Animal Care and Housing Form for Colorado 4-H Livestock Projects and Code of Show Ring Ethics. All forms must be on file in the Extension Office.

3. All 4-H members must show their dog in the showmanship contest. However extenuating circumstances may be addressed to the 4-H Dog Advisory Committee and Extension Agent as soon as possible.
4. Cloverbuds will not be allowed to show or exhibit any animals.
5. Only registered El Paso County 4-H members will be permitted to groom or provide any kind of care to the dogs once they have entered the Fairgrounds except in the interest of the safety of the child and the well-being of the animal. The 4-H youth should provide the primary care for the exhibit. Immediate family members and El Paso County 4-H Leaders can help with education or safety providing the 4-H member of said project is present and working/helping. Violations of this rule will be handled as follows: First violation – verbal warning; second violation – written warning; third violation – dismissal from the Fairgrounds.
6. All judges' decisions are final.
7. Where appropriate, premiums will be awarded to first, second and third place participants. First place will be awarded \$5.00, second place will be awarded \$3.00, and third place will be awarded \$2.00.
8. Fair Treatment Challenge must be filed in writing on the Fair Treatment Challenge Form with the Extension Agent responsible for the activity where the incident occurred accompanied with the fee of \$50 in cash (no checks) within 24 hours of the incident. Challenges can only be submitted by 4-H members. Please see the Fair Treatment Protocol attached to the Fair Treatment Challenge Form for further information and procedures.
9. Any violation of the following rules will automatically result in disqualification with no recourse: **(a)** the natural hair color of the animal cannot be altered using any artificial coloring. Any animal when rubbed with a cloth or glove, which shows evidence of artificial color, will be disqualified. **(b)** Any entries adding artificial hair or hair-like substances will be disqualified **(c)** The showing of animals of an ineligible age or showing unethically fitted animals is prohibited. **(d)** Unethical fitting will be deemed to consist of any method, which alters the natural conformation of any part of the animal's body.
10. The showing of animals of any ineligible age or showing unethically fitted animals is prohibited. Unethical fitting will be deemed to consist of any method which alters the natural conformation of any part of the animal's body, any animal having been operated upon or tampered with, for the purpose of concealing faults or with the intent to deceive will be disqualified and dismissed from the grounds. No administration of behavior-modifying drugs of any type, including alcohol, to any animals on the Fairgrounds will be permitted under any circumstances. Violators of this rule will be disqualified and dismissed from the Fairgrounds. An animal judged to be unsafe by the committee and superintendents may be dismissed from the Fairgrounds.
11. If, in the opinion of the 4-H Dog Advisory Committee and 4-H Youth Development Agent, an exhibitor does not take proper care of his/her animal(s) and area, after proper warning, the exhibitor may be dismissed from the Fairgrounds. Additionally, if any exhibitor or their families mistreat animals, the exhibitor may be dismissed from the Fairgrounds. *Violations of this rule will be handled as follows:* First violation – verbal warning; second– dismissal from the Fairgrounds.
12. Any behavior that is considered negative on the part of the exhibitor, family members of the exhibitor, or leaders, directed toward any show official, 4-H staff, 4-H exhibitor or their parents will result in disqualification and awards forfeited.
13. Any exhibitor dismissed from the Fairgrounds will forfeit all premiums.
14. Use of alcoholic beverages or drugs by 4-H members or adults will NOT be tolerated on either the Fairgrounds or in the 4-H and FFA camping area.
15. Appropriate attire for showing will be required, as defined by the 4-H dress code.
16. Each exhibitor is required to clean up after their own animals including any excrement or mess that your animal makes while on the Fairgrounds.
17. Health Requirements: All animals must be free of contagious or infectious diseases and in good condition. Animals that appear malnourished or unhealthy may be excused from the premises. If medication is required on any animal

before or during the Fair (including tranquilizers and injectable vitamins), the Extension Agent and Superintendent of that division **must be contacted before medication** is administered and provided with written documentation by a licensed Veterinarian. Administering medications approved by the FDA for human use but not for veterinary applications is ground for disqualifications. All animals may be examined on arrival for evidence of infections or contagious disease, and if such is found, they will be held in quarantine until examined by a veterinarian. The exhibitor is responsible for calling a practicing veterinarian for animal treatments. The Superintendent has the right to call for services of a veterinarian for the treatment of sick animals if the exhibitor is not available. The fee for veterinary services must be paid for by the exhibitor prior to the release of the animal from the Fairgrounds. **If drugs are administered, the Extension Agent, 4-H Dog Advisory Committee & official Fair veterinarian must be notified.**

18. **ATTENTION - IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics**

Exhibitors of animals shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in the competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all exhibits in any event at a show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics", fairs may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial, and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine examples. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards, and action proceeds, and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all animal shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors in competitive events.

1. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating to your animal is prohibited.
2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or show officials.
3. Exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at the fairs or shows.
4. The act of entering an animal in a show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in events, which culminates with the animal entering the food chain, shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with federal, state, and provincial statutes, regulations, and rules. If the laboratory report on the chemical analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medications, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample tested by the approved laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with burden of the owner, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise at any hearing in regard to the matter conducted by the fair or show premises, all treatment involving the use of drugs, and/or medications shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.
5. Any surgical procedures or injection of any foreign substances or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
8. No owner, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.

9. This application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
 10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible person to have any disciplinary action taken by the fair or show against such individuals published in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notice to members.
 11. The act of entering of an animal in a fair or show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorized with jurisdiction over such infractions.
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19. There is a camping area available for use by 4-H and FFA members and their immediate families. Space is on a first come first serve basis and camping permits should be purchased in advance from the Fair office. All 4-H and FFA members staying in the camping area must be accompanied by an adult. No dogs are permitted in the camping area without first receiving Fair Board approval. Additional camping regulations, rules and requirements are at the discretion of Fair management.
 20. No vehicle other than "Official Cars" will be permitted inside the fenced area around the barns and livestock arena after Monday at noon. Vehicles for the purpose of hauling feed and supplies will not be permitted on the Fairgrounds.
 21. Dates of approved current and effective vaccination of the dog for rabies and parvovirus must be provided on the *State 4-H ONLINE Dog Identification Sheet* and be on file in the Extension Office by **April 23**. It is strongly recommended that all backup dogs be registered. The state may have a later deadline than El Paso County's April 23rd Deadline.
 - a) It is recommended that all dogs be vaccinated for kennel cough (Bordetella). If the dog's vaccinations are not current, a written statement from your veterinarian stating why not, must be attached to the entry form.
 22. Bitches in season and lame dogs will not be allowed to compete. No bitch in heat, obviously pregnant or lactating bitches will be allowed to compete.
 23. Handlers must own their project dog individually or in partnership with a parent or guardian during the complete duration of the project.
 24. Exhibitors may exhibit any number of dogs, but only one dog per class for showmanship. Multiple dogs may be used in rally, agility, and obedience. Sits and downs will be handled for multiple dogs at the judge's discretion.
 25. Individual Dogs can only be shown once per class. Dogs cannot be shown by 2 handlers in the same class.
 26. Dogs must be trained and shown primarily by the 4-H exhibitor during the complete duration of the dog project.
 27. Dogs must be shown in at least one 4-H dog show prior to County Fair in the division in which you are showing. Copies of the score sheets must be turned in to the Extension Office **no later than July 13**. **It is the responsibility of the 4-H member to make sure score sheets are turned in.** Trial requirements for the County Fair will be the same as Colorado State 4-H Contest Requirements.
 28. Each 4-H member will take a written test regarding general knowledge of the dog project. There will be a Junior, Intermediate and Senior level exam. This test score will also be used toward Premier Exhibitor.
 29. Armbands for all shows will be picked up the day of the show at check in.
 30. The handler must have complete control of the dog at all times. Any dogs showing signs of aggression toward people or other dogs anywhere on the show grounds either inside or outside the show ring may be asked to leave for the general safety of all. The Dog Superintendent and/or the 4-H Youth Development Agent can make this request. If made, the dog must be immediately removed from the grounds. If a question arises regarding such a request, it will be reviewed by a committee of three, consisting of the 4-H Youth Development Agent, a dog superintendent, and a dog show official be it a volunteer or the judge, their decision will be final.

31. The judge must disqualify any dog that attempts to attack any person in the ring. He/she shall excuse a dog that attacks another dog in the ring or that appears dangerous to other dogs in the ring.
32. Adults may handle a dog to prevent a fight or when the dog is unmanageable to the 4-H exhibitor.

STATE FAIR REQUIREMENTS

(See State Fair Contest Requirements for complete rules)

1. Exhibitor must have an up to date record book, exhibited in at least one 4-H dog show and enter in County Fair.
2. The highest score from the required dog show and the County Fair show will be totaled. The four highest scores from each class will determine selection for exhibitors to officially represent El Paso County. Per state regulations, qualifying scores are as follows: 170 and above in showmanship, 170 and above in obedience and 70 and above in rally.
3. ALL NQ or Non Qualifying scores will be included in the tabulations to determine who goes to state.

4-H DOG PHOTO SHARING

Rules

1. Submit photos with your fair entry form at the Fairgrounds on Exhibit Day—the Friday before the fair begins.
2. The subject of the photo must be your project dog.
3. 4-H members may only submit one photo for the 4-H Dog Photo Contest.
4. The 4-H exhibitor must take the photo.
5. Color or black & white photos will be accepted.
6. Any size up to 8" x 10" is acceptable.
7. The photo must be in a stand up frame.
8. The exhibitors name, age and club must be on the back of the frame.
9. Categories are: Cloverbud, Junior, Intermediate and Senior.
10. All participants receive a participation ribbon.

4-H Canine Good Citizen (CGC)

Chair: TBD **Fee:** None

The CGC visitation program offers many growing opportunities for 4-H members, all of which help develop desirable traits. 4-H members gain lifelong skills and assets by utilizing their project. Members learn to volunteer and provide service to the community. They also learn the patience to teach their dog lifelong good citizen skills while at the same time earning a certificate that evaluates these skills.

Eligibility

1. Dogs and handlers must be enrolled in El Paso County 4-H.
2. Dogs must be at least one year of age.
3. The dog must be owned by the handler or in partnership with the handler's family and live in the family household.
4. The dog must be current on all shots/vaccinations and licensing required by the County and City of residence. Verification must be provided at class registration.

5. The dog may not be pregnant or nursing puppies, nor may bitches be in season. This rule applies to all community visits.

Participation Requirements

1. Complete the required training necessary to earn a CGC Certificate, either by enrolling in a CGC class, or ordering the CGC training information from www.akc.org and training your dog.
2. Pass the required AKC CGC test to earn your CGC certificate from a registered AKC CGC Evaluator. **All dogs going on field trips/community visits must pass this test.** Handlers must have proof of CGC certification and shot records when performing visits.
3. Members must participate in a minimum of three CGC visits, one being a nursing home.
4. All junior participants (4-H ages 8-10) must have a parent or guardian present on all visits.
5. Dogs must be cleaned and groomed for all visits.
6. Handlers must follow the 4-H dress code and they must wear rubber soled, closed-toe shoes. No slip on shoes, crocs, sandals, etc.
7. All handlers should use a 2, 4, or 6-foot leather or nylon lead. Length should be based on size of dog and handler for best control. NO retractable leashes!
8. All dogs should be equipped with a buckle or slip (choke) collar for best control.
9. All handlers must bring clean up supplies and poop bags for any accidents.

County Fair Exhibit Requirements

1. Complete the participation requirements listed above and complete all dog project requirements.
2. Submit by 2:00pm on Exhibit Day (Friday before County Fair) a tri-fold poster board that describes your activities/learning process in CGC.
 - a. Display boards (show boards) for fair must be tri-fold boards that measure 4 ft. wide x 3 ft. tall. They should be made of lightweight cardboard, but not poster board. Pre-cut boards are available at most craft and shopping centers. No part of your display may extend beyond these boundaries.
3. Awards
 - a. 1st year – CGC Bandanna and CGC Rosette
 - b. 2nd year – CGC Leash
 - c. 3rd year – CGC T-shirt
 - d. 4th year - CGC Pin

Trick Dog Titles

Trick dog titles are an opportunity for the student and the dog to form a strong bond working together to learn new tricks. The dog titles are based on the Kyra Sundance Program of *“Do More With Your Dog”*. Kyra Sundance has several books out about dog tricks, recommended to start is the *“101 Dog Tricks”*, there is a Kids Edition as well as an Adult Edition. These tricks are easy to learn and build upon platforms. To earn the 1st Trick Dog Title the student and dog must learn 15 tricks. 8 of these 15 tricks are required for the first title thru our 4-H program. Things like Heel, Sit, Come. Basics you must learn for the beginning obedience classes. (Asterisked on the chart below.) The last 7 tricks are the choice of each student from the tricks listed.

Each Dog/Student Team must present their trick either in person or via a video to a Trick Dog Instructor. (This job will eventually also be assigned to upper level members) The Dog/Member Team will earn a title and Ribbon once the tricks are completed and verified. Titles and Ribbons to be awarded at year end.

4. Each entry can earn a maximum of 10 points on their ability to groom their own animal and 100 points on their ability to show their own animal, and 100 points for their ability to show EACH of the other species as broken down on the score sheet.

The Three Highest Awards, Dog Project Students Can Earn that are based on their project's success. (listed in order of importance)

1. 4-H HANDLER VERSATILITY AWARD*

This award is intended to recognize the achievements of those handlers that excel in the many aspects of the 4-H Dog Project. It also takes into account those members that show strong leadership skills, community service excellence, club involvement, and which overall embody the motto of 4-H, "To Make the Best Better." It is based on completion of application. With the award going to the one with the highest points on the application. The completed application is due to the Dog Superintendent no later than September 30th. Please review the full rules written in the application. 2) 4-H DOG PREMIER EXHIBITOR *

All Exhibitors are encouraged to enter. Entries for this division should be made on the Fair Entry Form. Premier Exhibitor is awarded to the exhibitor that best combines several aspects of the 4-H dog project experience. There will not be any distinction between ages.

The following criteria and points will be used to tabulate the Premier Exhibitor.

1. Showmanship Score at County Fair
2. Record Book Score
3. Quiz Score (Quiz given at county fair)
4. Interview Score (Interview given at county fair)

3) 4-H DOG VERSATILITY AWARD*

This award is intended to recognize the achievements of talented dogs that excel in many disciplines, including Showmanship, Obedience, Rally and Agility. The dog with the highest combined outside and county fair scores for three of the four disciplines listed above, will earn this award.

All of these awards will be given at a time determined by the Dog Superintendent, in the fall of the year, following the 4-H year when they were earned.

**Dog Versatility and Handler Versatility may NOT be won by the same person. Handler Versatility takes precedence over Dog Versatility.*

SHOWMANSHIP AWARDS

1. First through sixth place ribbons will be awarded in Showmanship for scores of 170 or above.
2. Special awards will be given to the Junior, Intermediate and Senior Grand Champions and other special awards will be given to the Reserve Grand Champions. (Grand Champions are members who earn the highest score in their age category in novice and open classes combined.)
3. Grand Champions and Reserve Grand Champions are required to participate in the county Round Robin Contest. (See above Round Robin Description) Currently you must have special permission not to attend Round Robin or forfeit your ribbons for Grand and Reserve Grand prizes, Ribbons and Premium Money.

OBEDIENCE AWARDS

1. First through sixth place ribbons will be awarded for scores over 170 that have received 50 percent or more of the maximum point value of each exercise
2. Special awards will be awarded to High Point in Trail Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion for the Beginner Novice Division, Novice Division and Grad Novice/Advanced Division.

RALLY AWARDS

1. First through sixth place ribbons will be awarded for scores 70 and above
 1. Special awards will be given to the High Point Grand Champions and Reserve Grand Champions in Novice, Advanced, and Excellent (excellent includes those competing in adv/exe combined)

AGILITY AWARDS

1. Green qualifying ribbons given to every participant with a qualifying score of 70 and above.
2. First through fourth place ribbons will be awarded for scores 70 and above.
3. All participants scoring 70 and above will get a blue ribbon, those scoring 40 to 69 will get a red ribbon, and those scoring 39 and below will get a white ribbon.
4. Rosettes will be given to the Novice, Intermediate, Advanced and Excellent Jump and Run Grand Champions and Reserve Grand Champions.
5. Rosettes will be given to the Novice, Intermediate, Advanced and Excellent Basic Agility Dog Grand Champions and Reserve Grand Champions.
6. Rosettes will be given to the Foundation Agility Dogs Grand Champions and Reserve Grand Champions.
7. Special awards will be given to the combined JnR and BAD Overall High Point in Trial Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion High Point in trial Agility of the day.

4-H DOG SPORTSMANSHIP AWARDS

You may nominate individuals for an Outstanding Sportsmanship Award. There will be four divisions in which nominations will be accepted; Junior, Intermediate, Senior and Adult (for 4-H parents/volunteers). Nominations will be accepted online at: <http://elpaso.extension.colostate.edu/sportsmanship-nomination-form/>. Nominations will be accepted until the last Thursday in August. A committee will be selected by the superintendent to screen the nominations and select the award recipients.

Various qualities should be considered when selecting nominees such as helping others, positive attitude, cooperation, punctuality, work ethic, conduct, and others as seen fit. Sportsmanship Awards will be awarded at El Paso County 4-H Achievement Celebration in the fall.

SHOWMANSHIP

Trial Rules:

1. A show collar and 4-foot lead are required to participate.
2. Unless it is a health or safety issue for the exhibitor or dog, all appropriate dogs will be tabled for showmanship (see Tabled Breed List in the Colorado State Contest Requirements). It is always left to the judge's discretion.
3. Junior, Intermediate and Senior Novice classes are for those members who are in their first year in the 4-H dog project and have no prior outside showmanship experience as determined by the county. If prior experience is determined by the county, the exhibitor must move into open class competition in his/her appropriate age group.

General Tips for Showmanship:

1. No grooming equipment will be allowed in the showmanship ring at any time.
2. Depending on what you are wearing in the showmanship ring, use proper kneeling etiquette. If you are in a skirt, it is best to kneel on both knees. If you are wearing pants, it would be appropriate to kneel on only one knee.
3. Members with smaller breeds will be expected to show their dogs on a table. Judges will take into consideration the size and physical abilities of the handler. A list and guidelines for tabling breeds can be found in the project manual on pages 108 & 109. A more complete list is available on the American Kennel Club website at www.akc.org.
4. If the member is showing a mixed-breed dog; they should determine what breed their dog most resembles, and show in the manner of that breed. If you have a mixed breed dog, you can go to AKC website and look at different pictures of the breeds of dog to decide which breed your dog looks most like.
5. No dog tags should be on the dog when showing in the ring. Only the correct equipment for a showmanship class should be used. It is very important that your dog wear tags at all times, except when in the show ring.

Classes:

CLASS 499: Puppy Class Showmanship (Non Regular Class to meet showmanship requirements)

This class is for members of all ages. You can enter this class with puppies age 9 months or younger. If you have an of age dog, you must also enter regular showmanship. This class is for young dogs getting their first taste of showmanship. Each handler and puppy will enter the ring individually. This is a PASS/FAIL Class no scores are given. Handler should know basic showmanship procedures.

CLASS 500: Junior Novice Showmanship

This class is for members who are 8 – 10 years old as of December 31 of the previous year, are in their 1st year of participation in the project, and have no prior experience with any other dog showing entity.

CLASS 501: Junior Open Showmanship

This class is for members who are 8-10 years old as of December 31 of the previous year and have previous experience in showmanship.

CLASS 502: Intermediate Novice Showmanship

This class is for members who are 11-13 years old as of December 31 of the previous year, are in their 1st year of participation in the project, and have no prior experience with any other dog showing entity.

CLASS 503: Intermediate Open Showmanship

This class is for members who are 11-13 years old as of December 31 of the previous year and have previous experience in showmanship.

CLASS 504: Intermediate Advanced Showmanship

This class is for members who are 11-13 years old as of December 31 of the previous year and have previous experience in showmanship. Any member who has placed 1st through 10th at State Fair in Intermediate Open Showmanship must enter Intermediate Advanced Showmanship

CLASS 505: Senior Novice Showmanship

This class is for members who are 14-18 years old as of December 31 of the previous year, are in their 1st year of participation in the project, and have no prior experience with any other dog showing entity.

CLASS 506: Senior Open Showmanship

This class is for members who are 14-18 years old as of December 31 of the previous year and have previous experience in showmanship.

CLASS 552: Senior Advanced Showmanship

This class is for members who are 14-18 years of age as of December 31 of the previous year. Any member who has placed 1st through 10th at State Fair in Senior Open Showmanship must enter Senior Advanced Showmanship.

OBEDIENCE

Dog/Handler Eligibility:

1. After once earning a qualifying score in competition as a 4-H project dog at the County or State Fair, that same dog is no longer eligible for exhibition in the same division at any following County or State Fair, except Pre Open, Open and Utility classes.
2. A dog with any other rally or obedience title is disqualified from entering the class for which degree was awarded, or any lower class, except if that title was won less than four months before the County Fair. In this case the dog is eligible for entry in the same class. Rule 1 takes precedence over this rule.
3. Any dog 7 years or older may be show in the veterans division. Dog shown as a veteran are not eligible for any other obedience classes. It is the choice of the member, the member's parent and the member's trainer and/or veterinarian as to giving a dog veterans designation. Veteran dogs will compete only against other veteran dogs for ribbons and awards. Their scores will not count toward awards in any other obedience division. (Refer to State Fair Rules for more complete details of the Veteran Division)

Trial Rules:

1. All 4-H obedience classes will be patterned after the latest AKC obedience guidelines whenever possible, except that dog registry with AKC is not required. Some exercises and rules may have been adapted from AKC to better serve the youth of this program.
2. Entered dogs must wear a slip collar (choke collar) and be on a six-foot leash at all times except when in the obedience ring. No buckle collars, no slip leads, no pinch collars, no harnesses. The six-foot leash must be nylon or leather, no chains.
3. No dog tags can be on the dog when showing in the ring. This includes name tags, rabies tags, or anything else that hangs from the dog's collar. It is very important that your dog wear tags at all times, except when in the show ring.

BEGINNER NOVICE OBEDIENCE DIVISION

CLASS 509: Puppy Class

Puppy classes will be for puppies which are not ready for regular obedience classes. Please see the State Fair Contest Requirements for an in-depth description of the puppy class.

CLASS 510: Beginner Novice A

This class is open only to handlers and their dogs in their first year of dog-project work.

CLASS 511: Beginner Novice B

This class is open only to second-year project members and must be the same youth and dog team that showed the previous year in Beginner-Novice A who have never received a blue ribbon at a previous County or State Fair in this class.

CLASS 512: Beginner Novice C – 1st year

Beginner Novice C – 1st year: This class includes members with previous obedience training who are working with a new dog or a dog with previous experience in an organized training class working with a new 4-H member. All exercises will be performed on leash.

CLASS 513: Beginner Novice C – 2nd year

This class is open only to those in the second year of Beginner Novice C training and must be the same youth and dog team that showed the previous year in Beginner Novice C – 1st year. All exercises will be performed on leash

Grand Champion/Reserve Grand Awards for Novice Obedience Division

NOVICE OBEDIENCE DIVISION

CLASS 514: Novice A

This class is open to members with no prior experience in Novice Dog Training.

CLASS 515: Novice B

This class is open to experienced members in their second year or above who have never received a blue ribbon at a previous County or State Fair in this class. This class includes members with previous obedience training who are working with a new dog.

CLASS 516: Novice Veterans

Grand Champion/Reserve Grand Awards for Grad Novice and Advanced Obedience Division(Called Advance Division for El Paso County Fair.

GRADUATE NOVICE OBEDIENCE DIVISION

CLASS 517: Pre Graduate Novice A

This class is open to members with no prior experience in Pre-Grad Novice Dog Training. This class was previously called “Grad Novice A”.

CLASS 518: Pre Graduate Novice B

This class is open to experienced members in their second year or above of Pre-Grad Novice 4-H Dog Training. This class was previously called “Grad Novice B”.

CLASS 519: Pre Graduate Novice Veterans

CLASS 520: Graduate Novice A

This class was previously called “Pre-Open”. The name has been changed to more closely follow AKC class names. This class is for members in their 1st year of Grad Novice training.

CLASS 521: Graduate Novice B

This class was previously called “Pre-Open”. The name has been changed to more closely follow AKC class names. This class is for members in their 2nd or higher year of Grad Novice training.

RALLY

Trial Rules:

1. A dog with any other rally or obedience title is disqualified from entering the class for which degree was awarded, or any lower class, except if that title was won less than four months before the County Fair. In this case the dog is eligible for entry in the same class.
2. All 4-H Rally classes will be patterned after the latest AKC obedience guidelines whenever possible, except that dog registry with AKC is not required. Some exercises and rules may have been adapted from AKC to better serve the youth of this program.
3. All jump heights will conform with current (as of 2011 rules and regulations) AKC height and broad jump recommendations.
4. Walk-throughs will be announced. Youth will not be allowed to walk through the pattern at any time other than the official walk-through time.
5. Please refer to the Colorado State 4-H Dog Project Rally Obedience Rules and Regulations for Exhibitors, Judges and Stewards for complete information.
6. No dog tags can be on the dog when showing in the ring. This includes name tags, rabies tags, or anything else that hangs from the dog's collar. It is very important that your dog wear tags at all times, except when in the show ring.

Classes:

CLASS 532: Rally Novice A

This class is for members and their dogs in their first year of Rally obedience who have not received a blue ribbon at any County or State Fair and/or have not received an equivalent title from any national dog association. A member may only compete in Rally A for one year.

CLASS 533: Rally Novice B

This class is for any member who is in their second year or above of Rally Obedience with the same dog used in the Rally Novice A Class or who is starting a dog that has never competed in Rally. Members are allowed to compete in this class until they have obtained a blue ribbon at County or State Fair or the dog being shown has received an equivalent title from a national dog association.

CLASS 534: Rally Advanced A

Rally Advanced A is for members in their first year of Rally Advanced Training who have not received a blue ribbon in Rally Advanced at County or State Fair, and/or have not received an equivalent title from any national dog association. A member may only compete in Rally Advanced A class for one year.

CLASS 535: Rally Advanced B

This class is for any member who is in their second year or above of Rally Advanced Obedience. Members are allowed to compete in this class until they have obtained a blue ribbon at County or State Fair, or the dog being shown has received an equivalent title from a national dog association.

CLASS 536: Rally Excellent A

Rally Excellent A Class is for members who are in their first year of Rally Excellent training who have not received a blue ribbon in Rally Excellent at County or State Fair, and/or have not received an equivalent title for any national dog association. A member may only compete in the A class for one year.

CLASS 537: Rally Excellent B

This class is for any member who is in their second year or above of Rally Excellent Obedience. Members are allowed to compete in this class until they have obtained a blue ribbon at County or State Fair, or the dog being shown has received an equivalent title from a national dog association.

CLASS 538: Rally Advanced/Excellent A

This class is for members who have received a blue ribbon in Rally Excellent at County or State Fair or who has received the equivalent of an Excellent title from a national dog association. This class is for members in their 1st year of Advanced/Excellent training.

CLASS 539: Rally Advanced/Excellent B

This class is for members who have received a blue ribbon in Rally Advanced/ Excellent at County or State Fair or who has received the equivalent of a Rally Advanced/ Excellent title from a national dog association. This class is for members in their 2nd year or above of Advanced/Excellent training.

AGILITY

4-H Agility Rules for El Paso County, Colorado

Dog/Handler Eligibility:

1. Dogs must be at least 15 months old to compete in agility. It is recommended that larger breeds be at least 18 months old. This is because for most breeds the growth plates in the bones are still developing until the average age of fourteen months, even later for large breeds.
2. Dogs must have competed and passed either the Beginner Novice Obedience or Rally Novice Class.
3. 4-H members must be in their second year of the 4-H dog project. This requirement can be waived by the DAC committee if student can provide proof of competition in another venue. i.e. AKC, ASCA, etc.
4. All 4-H members are strongly encouraged to consult their veterinarian before beginning agility training to be sure that there are no problems such as hip dysplasia, disc problems, overweight, etc.
5. The handler and dog must know basic commands and perform off lead at each time of competition. Off leash heeling includes, forward, left turn, right turn, about turn and halt with automatic sit. The Recall. And at the judge's discretion may be asked for fast, slow normal and a down. Dog and handler will be tested before competing at each venue. See details in rules below.
6. Any breed or mixture of breeds and/or size dog is allowed to compete.
7. Two family members may share a dog, but there are a maximum number of four runs per dog per day. Each student during a competition may compete in the jumper and standard classes once each in a single competition.
8. Exhibitors must have a current level card prior to entering County Fair, indicating they have met the requirements to show in the class which they wish to enter.

Standard Handler and Dog Equipment:

1. Buckle collars ONLY.
2. No leashes but tabs can be used in all but advanced classes or higher. (TAB - 4" leather or nylon tab that snaps onto collar of choice, gives you a handle for the dog. No loop as can get paw caught.)
3. For safety reasons, handlers must wear rubber soled, closed toe shoes. No flip-flops, slip-ons, sandals, crocs etc. allowed.

Divisions (*Division A and B temporarily disbanded due to small competition numbers.*)

- Division A - handler has **never** put this title on any dog (in the class entered) to include all 4-H agility and any other similar venue.
- Division B - handler has **previously** put this title on any dog (in the class entered) to include 4-H agility and any other similar venue

Show Awards:

1. Each student with a passing score will receive a green qualifying ribbon.
2. First thru Sixth place ribbons will be awarded to the highest scores in each class.
3. All participants not receiving qualifying scores will be awarded a participation ribbon.
4. At county or state shows Grand Champion and Reserve Champion ribbons will be awarded. Each class level will be awarded the Grand and Reserve Ribbons. i.e.

Individual Class Rules, Scoring, Jump Height Requirements and Equipment

The information that has been shared to this point is intended to give you an overview of 4-H agility. The following discussion and tables will explain in detail what a handler and dog must do in each class obtain a qualifying score. Jump heights, rules for all levels (Foundation, Novice, Intermediate, Advanced, Excellent) and both class types (JnR and BAD) as well as judges scoring for earning that passing score will be explained. There will also be an equipment list defining each piece and its specifications.

Heeling Pretests REQUIRED before every show.

In order to determine that your dog is under control at a specific venue, a pretest will be given to each dog handler team. The team must come out onto the agility field and do a short off leash heeling pattern and off leash recall (Off leash heeling includes, forward, left turn, right turn, about turn and halt with automatic sit. The Recall. And at the judge's discretion may be asked for fast, slow normal and a down.) The actual heeling pattern is at the judge's discretion. If you fail this pretest you will not be allowed to compete at this venue.

Jump Heights

Maximum Jump Heights will apply to ALL classes.

To determine the jump height, the height of the dog at the withers (top of shoulder) is measured. When measuring the dog should be standing square on a flat surface. A ruler should be placed on top of the dog's shoulders at the withers. This is the height of the dog. By using the table below you can determine your dog's jump height.

Jump Heights based on the dog's shoulder measurement are as follows:

The dog's jump height shall be given on the entry form. Entries will be arranged according to the jump height of the dogs, from either high to low or low to high.

Height of dog at withers	Height to be jumped
Less than 10 inches	4 inches
10 inches to less than 15 inches	8 inches
15 inches to less than 20 inches	12 inches
20 inches and over	16 inches

It is the handler's responsibility to know the appropriate jump height for their dog. Changes in jump height will not be allowed once the entry has been received, unless the Judge determines that the dog, for physical reasons, should not be jumping at the entered height. If unsure of your dog's jump height, please ask a leader or instructor prior to entering a show to verify your dog's jump height.

Class Level Advancement

To advance in Class levels a handler/dog team must earn 3 passing scores or “legs”. Once a handler/dog team has earned 3 scores 70 or above in FAD, the team may move up to Novice. Then they must earn 3 passing scores 70 or above in Novice and then move to Intermediate. 3 passing scores of 70 or above in Intermediate and must move to advance. After 3 passing scores in Advance they can move to Excellent.

An index card with you and your dog’s name will be kept by the 4-H Superintendent will keep the show records of each show/match and who passed at that show. It will however be important for you to keep all your “Qualifying” green ribbons just in case some confusion should arise with the paperwork. Your “Qualifying” green ribbon is proof of a passing score for that class.

Agility Dog Excellent (ADX)

ADX is the highest agility title a dog and handler can earn in 4-H. It shows a very high level of expertise. A dog and handler in this category has put in many hours of practice. Thus the standards to earn this title are high. To compete for an ADX title the dog/handler team must have earned both the Advance Jump n Run title as well as the Advance Basic Agility title and have all 6 levels completed.

At a single show the dog/handler team must enter both JnR Advanced and BAD Advanced classes. The team must have a score 80 or higher in both classes on that day to earn 1 leg towards their ADX title. The team must earn 3 such passing scores to earn the ADX title.

General Course Information

1. Agility takes up a lot of room. The maximum number of obstacles used on a course should take into consideration how big of an area is available. Areas in which courses are set up should be at least 60 feet by 70 feet or close to it. As the classes advance a larger space is desirable. It will be up to the judge setting up the course to determine if the space is adequate.
2. Indoor courses must have flooring which provides both traction and cushion! (thick matting or another surface) It is recommended that 4-H dog agility groups check with kennel clubs or training centers in their area, if they are seeking appropriate indoor facilities.
3. The course will be clearly marked with a start/finish line.
4. Each obstacle will be marked with a number. Handlers and dogs will be required to follow the course in numerical order.
5. Before competition begins, the handlers (without dogs) will be allowed to walk through the course to become familiar with the course. The walk through is restricted to the handlers only and is limited to 10 minutes.
6. If at all possible, a warm-up jump outside of the ring should be available for handlers and dogs. Handlers should be considerate of others in taking turns at the warm-up jump.
7. Any dog whose hair covers its eyes and may interfere with its vision of the obstacles may tie the hair back.
8. Food and toys are not permitted on the course.
9. Handlers are not permitted to have whistles, stopwatches, fanny packs or other training devices on the course.
10. The handlers may be on either side of the dog while running the course.
11. A dog's time starts whenever any part of the dog crosses the start line. Its time will end when any part of the dog crosses the finish line.
12. Course time will be used only for determining tie breakers for placements.

Judges Scoring

1. Each course is worth a maximum 100 points.
2. A penalty consists of the loss of 2 or 5 points. Penalties will be given EACH time the penalty happens on the course.
3. **5 point penalties** (judge holds up two hands) include:
 - Not making contact in contact zones
 - Not doing the obstacles in proper order
 - Not completing an obstacle
 - The handler going over the obstacle with the dog
 - Missing one or more weave poles
 - Losing control of the dog while on the course
 - Any interference or outside assistance that aids the dog or is intended to aid the dog or handler
 - Incomplete performance of an obstacle
 - Excess handling of dog (dog not know obstacles and being led)
4. **2 point penalties** (judge holds up one hand) include:
 - Knocking down a jump bar
 - Excessively guiding the dog
 - Touching the dog, or touching the obstacle
 - Excessive or harsh commands or corrections
 - Failure to follow judge's verbal instructions
5. The only penalty for breaking a sit or a down on the pause table is the extra time that accumulates when the count stops, the count will not resume until the dog is back in position. (5 second sit or down with judge counting)
6. The handler/dog team run will be timed. Time will be used for a tie breaker when doing placements with scores. In the case of a tie in total points, the fastest time will win.
7. If the judge determines that a dog is no longer working with the handler, the team will be excused from the course.
8. The contact zone on the A-frame, dog walk and teeter is the contrasting colored zone (usually yellow) on the start and end of each obstacle. Dogs must step on the contact zones or receive a 5 pt penalty.
9. Handlers are not to jump over obstacles with the dog.
10. Un-sportsmanlike conduct in the show ring or on the show grounds will not be tolerated. The handler and dog will be excused from the competition and asked to leave the show site.
11. If the dog urinates or defecates in the ring (from the time it enters until it leaves the ring), the dog and handler will be disqualified from that class.
12. Any dog that commits to a contact obstacle (A-frame, dog walk, teeter) with all four paws must, for safety reasons, continue with the obstacle. Whether obstacle is completed or if the dog jumps off, dog and handler must go on to the next obstacle and may not attempt that obstacle again.

13. A score of 70 or higher is considered a Qualifying Score in all classes.

2. Special Awards will be given to the Junior, Intermediate and Senior Grand Champions and other special awards will be given to the Reserve Grand Champions. (Grand Champions are members who earn the highest score in their age category in novice and open classes combined.)

Obedience:

1. First through sixth place ribbons will be awarded for scores over 170 that have received 50 percent or more of the maximum point value of each exercise
2. Special Awards will be awarded to Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion high point Beginner Novice Division, Novice Division and Grad Novice/Advanced Division.

Rally:

2. First through sixth place ribbons will be awarded for scores 70 and above.
3. Special awards will be given to the High Point Grand Champions and Reserve Grand Champions in Novice, Advanced, Excellent (excellent includes those competing in adv./exe. combined)

Agility:

1. Green qualifying ribbons given to every participant with a qualifying score of 70 and above.
2. First through fourth place ribbons will be awarded for scores 70 and above.
3. All participants scoring 70 and above will get a blue ribbon, those scoring 40 to 69 will get a red ribbon, and those scoring 39 and below will get a white ribbon.
4. Rosettes will be given to the Novice, Intermediate, Advanced and Excellent Jump and Run Grand Champions and Reserve Grand Champions.
5. Rosettes will be given to the Novice, Intermediate, Advanced and Excellent Basic Agility Dog Grand Champions and Reserve Grand Champions.
6. Special awards will be given to the combined JnR and BAD Overall High Point in Trial Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion High Point in trial Agility of the day.
